Sky Valley Fire's Community Risk Reduction

Sky Valley Fire receives DNR/Forest Service Grant for a wood chipper:

In a continuing effort to help reduce wildland fire danger in our fire district, Sky Valley Fire applied for and received a grant! The grant is from the Department of Natural Resources/Forest Service for the purchase of a commercial grade wood chipper.

With the purchase of our new wood chipper, the district plans to have scheduled days throughout the year that residents can bring their tree branches and yard clippings to **Fire Station 54** (42013 SR 2) for disposal.



The district also has plans to have the wood chipper available for communities in the fire district. This would be a scheduled day on site in our local communities.

Sky Valley Fire purchased this wood chipper so that can be towed behind a department vehicle, and is capable of chipping 7" diameter tree branches.

Sky Valley Fire is currently establishing operating procedures and training personnel on the use of the wood chipper and expect to have the equipment in service by the beginning of summer.

Today, 9-1-1 Can't Find You

Over 80% of calls made to 9-1-1 come from mobile phones. When you dial 9-1-1 from a mobile phone, the 9-1-1 call takers have very little information to help you – only your phone number and a very general sense of your location.

This is a serious problem in an emergency when seconds count, particularly if you or your loved ones have medical conditions, or are unable to safely speak.

With Smart911, you can provide 9-1-1 call takers and first responders critical information you want them to know in any kind of emergency.

When you call 9-1-1, your Smart911 Safety Profile displays on the 9-1-1 screen and the 9-1-1 call takers can view your addresses, medical information, home information, description of pets and vehicles, and emergency contacts. You can provide as much or as little information as you like.

Smart911 is a national service meaning your Smart911 Safety Profile travels with you and is visible to any participating 9-1-1 center nationwide.



Safety Profiles can Include:



People living in your household



Medications and medical equipment



Vehicle descriptions



Phone numbers associated with your family



Medical conditions and allergies



Property details, layout and utility information

CPR & First Aid Certification Classes

CPR/AED

This course teaches adult CPR and AED use, as well as how to relieve choking on an adult. This course includes hands on skills training.

Basic First Aid / CPR AED

This course teaches critical skills needed to respond to and manage a first aid, choking, or sudden cardiac arrest emergency in the first few minutes until emergency medical services (EMS) arrives.

Students learn skills such as how to treat bleeding, sprains, broken bones, shock, and other first aid emergencies. This course also covers the signs and symptoms of medical emergencies such as heart attack, stroke and diabetic emergencies.

Basic Life Support Classes (BLS)

This course teaches CPR/AED for both single-rescuer and team, and basic life support skills in a prehospital settings. This course is designed for healthcare professionals and other people who need to know how to perform CPR and other basic cardiovascular life support skills. In addition, BLS training can be appropriate for laypeople whose work brings them into contact with members of the public, such as a school, fitness center, or hotel and restaurant employees.
